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ABOUT THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE PROGRAM AND MAJOR

The major in criminal justice provides a basic understanding of the criminal justice system and the society in which it functions. The first 60 credits are composed primarily of general education courses to develop a broad educational background, along with the first three core criminal justice courses. After completion of 60 credits, in-depth knowledge can be obtained by careful selection of courses in policing, corrections, criminological theory, law, forensic investigation, Substance Abuse (AODA) counseling, and private security.

The UW-Platteville Criminal Justice and Forensic Investigation programs have received national recognition for the superior quality of their internship programs. As a result, participation in internship programs is competitive. The programs reserve the right to refuse a student an internship if they are not a suitable candidate on the basis of scholarship, verbal ability, or character. To be eligible for internship, the student must have earned at least 60 credits plus 12 upper division criminal justice/forensic investigation credits and a 2.50 G.P.A.

In cooperation with the UW-Platteville Department of Psychology, undergraduate Criminal Justice majors may complete the coursework needed for the State of Wisconsin Social Worker Training Certificate.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Graduates of the criminal justice program should:

1. Exhibit an understanding of fundamental concepts related to the interrelationship of various components within the criminal justice system (i.e., law enforcement, courts, and corrections)
2. Apply criminological theories in explaining criminal behavior and the criminal justice process
3. Demonstrate their ability to formulate a problem/topic, assemble relevant research and resources, and synthesize the data in a manner to constitute a formal proposal or research paper
4. Analyze and evaluate social, cultural, and technological change and its impact on the criminal justice system
5. Understand, analyze, and critically evaluate social research
6. Display a working knowledge of qualitative and quantitative research methods
7. Demonstrate in-depth knowledge of substantive areas within the discipline of criminal justice
8. Apply their knowledge toward further study and careers
